I wish the greater majority of boaters took better advantage of the boater safety training offered by the USPS. Unfortunately, it's not mandatory (unless your birthday falls after May 1, 1996) so it's not good enough that <u>we</u> know the rules-of-the-road and practice safe vessel operation. The recent second boating collision on Lake George is a perfect example. Boat rental on the lake has been around forever and the collision of a rental boat (towing a tube) with a second boat, illustrates the problem of untrained boaters operating beyond their capabilities or safe speeds (both of those boaters had no training!). OK enough.

Here's hoping for an extended summer of good weather for all us good boaters. (with no more boating incidents). Boat Safe!

Governor Cuomo signs bill strengthening boating while intoxicated penalties

Gov. Andrew Cuomo on Tuesday signed into law a new bill that requires courts to consider prior intoxicated and impaired driving convictions when sentencing someone for intoxicated or impaired boating. Under the new law, a judge would be required to consider prior DWIs or DWAIs within a five-year period for any 30-day BWI sentence. A judge would be required to consider prior DWIs or DWAIs within a 10-year period for any 180-day BWAI sentence. The idea is that a sentencing judge would be required to impose a higher sentence on repeat intoxicated machine operation offenders, Cuomo's office said. "Those who repeatedly violate intoxicated operation laws should not be given leniency because they have re-offended in a boat versus a car," the bill's justification memo states. Legislation remained stalled for nearly six sessions before an amended version was approved in June. The law takes effect Nov. 1st, 2016.

Dubbed Tiffany Heitkamp's Law in memory of the Syracuse-area woman killed during a 2006 boating while intoxicated accident, the enacting legislation was carried by Syracuse representatives Assemblyman William Magnarelli and state Senator John DeFrancisco. "Whether behind the wheel of a car or a boat, drunk drivers are a danger to themselves and a menace to others," Cuomo said in a statement. "This new law closes this loophole and will help keep these dangerous individuals off our roads and waterways, avoiding more senseless tragedies." The signing of the legislation comes weeks after a Log Bay Day boating accident on Lake George killed an 8-year-old girl and injured her mother. Authorities believe the defendants in that case were drinking before the accident. None of the defendants were hit with any type of boating while intoxicated or ability impaired charges. Educational Meeting held August 17th – Rusty Anchor Bar and Restaurant

The following was provided all those attending the annual Educational Meeting of the Squadron. Many members and their guests attended this all important annual event. SEO Donna Canestraro and ASEO Kevin McCarthy presented information on the many course and seminar offerings available through the USPS Education Department. America's Boating Course III- [ABC-3]: This course is open to the public - The America's Boating Course is designed to familiarize the student with the fundamentals of safe boating and qualifies for certification in most states that require a boating education before operating a boat or personal watercraft. The course is structured for one night a week at two hours each session or over a weekend. A course study guide and supporting materials are available. Subjects covered include - Boat handling under normal conditions, Types of boats and boating terminology, Required and recommended equipment, Boating regulations and navigation rules, Lines and knots, Adverse conditions and emergencies, Weather, Charts and aids to navigation, Regional boating, Piloting techniques, Engine troubleshooting, Fundamentals of sailing, Marine radiotelephone usage, Trailer boating and PWC Operation.

Seamanship [S]: Building on the basics taught in the ABC Boating course, Seamanship is the recommended first course for new members, both power boaters and sailors. The student learns practical marlinespike, navigation rules, hull design and performance, responsibilities of the skipper, boat care, operating a boat under normal and abnormal conditions, what to do in various emergencies and weather conditions, nautical customs and common courtesy on the water. This course provides an introduction to the USPS educational program and a strong foundation for the other Advanced Grades courses listed on the reverse side of this handout.

<u>Piloting [P]:</u> Piloting introduces the fundamentals of piloting and positioning – the study of marine charts, aids to navigation, adjustment and use of the mariner's compass, dead reckoning, planning and plotting courses, and taking bearings to determine on-the- water position.

Advanced Piloting [AP]: Advanced Piloting builds on the knowledge gained in Piloting to teach how to navigate safely in coastal waters predict tides and tidal currents and their impact on boat position, advanced positioning techniques, and the use of electronic navigation systems for positioning and course planning.

<u>Junior Navigation [JN]:</u> Junior Navigation begins the study of offshore (open-ocean) navigation-integrated electronic positioning systems, sight taking with a mariner's sextant on the sun, moon, planets, and stars, how to reduce sights using the nautical almanac to determine position, and passage planning with special open ocean charts.

<u>Navigation [N]</u>: Navigation further develops the understanding of celestial navigation theory and the skills in sight taking and reduction-- additional sight reduction techniques and the orderly methods of carrying on the day's work of a navigator at sea. Of particular interest and importance is the study of offshore navigation using minimal data and/or equipment, such as when on a disabled vessel or lifeboat.

<u>Elective Courses</u>: Several elective courses are also available including Cruise Planning, Engine Maintenance, Instructor Development, Marine Electronics, Sail, and Weather. If you are interested in any of these elective courses – contact the Squadron Educational Officer.
