board we were able venture up to The Narrows and camp out a few days in "Indian Summer" like warm weather. Despite the warmth we remembered to wear our PFDs, and it's a good thing we did, for sure enough there was an ENCON ranger checking to make sure the few boaters that were out were in compliance with the new regulations requiring that boaters actually WEAR a PFD while boating from November 1 to May 1.



The reasoning behind this new rule is that when the water is cold it can be difficult to swim or use your muscles normally. This might make it impossible to find and don a stored PFD. Though I never learned to swim, and grew up living on the shore of Lake George, I've been very lucky and have only had a few close calls. The water temperature on our trip was 51 degrees, so rule or not, we decided to wear our life jackets in the canoe.

> One of the other concerns I had in planning for the trip was wind. My power boat Proteus" had already been put away for the winter which meant traveling by canoe. Many of you have seen Lake George on a windy day. It can go from calm to heavy waves n less than an hour. Fortunately there too I was lucky, for with the warm weather came light south wind and the trip out to the Narrows was smooth and relaxing. The forecast several days out

was less certain but I figured if the weather was expected to be windy, we'd leave a day early on Tuesday. By Monday the National Weather Service predicted light winds for Wednesday morning, so I decided we could stay until then. Unfortunately the forecast was wrong and we had to return down the lake Wednesday in strong north wind and whitecaps. At times it was a bit hairy but we made it back okay

The following Sunday, the 15th, the weather was again fair and light wind, so by myself I took another canoe ride, this time just a day trip up to The Narrows and back. I like to ride my snow machine "Yeti" during the winter, but I'm already anxious for spring and ice-out!

Even though the boats are put away and the lake will soon be freezing, the Squadron will still have plenty of activities and rendezvous coming up, so I hope to see everyone at the next activities! 奉

New York Navigation Law Update for persons on boats less than 21 feet

This applies to everyone (including persons on larger boats making use of dinghy's they may have)

Beginning November 1, 2009, Section 40. Subdivision 1 of the Navigation Law shall be amended by adding new paragraph (e), which reads as follows:

No owner or operator of a pleasure vessel less than twenty-one feet, including rowboats, canoes, and kayaks shall permit its operation, between November first and May first, unless each person on board such vessel is wearing a securely fastened United States Coast Guard approved wearable personal flotation device of an appropriate size when such vessel is underway.

Failure to wear a lifejacket on such vessels will be considered a violation under Section 73-c if the Navigation Law and is punishable by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$250, applicable to either the operator and/or the owner of the vessel.

On July 11th, 2009 Governor Paterson signed this law which goes into effect on November 1st 2009

This new law will raise awareness and has the potential to save lives. Cold water immersion and hypothermia are twin dangers faced by a boater when a boat swamps or cap-

sizes in water temperatures less than 60 degrees F. During the late fall and early spring, waterways have less boat traffic and response by rescue and law enforcement may be slower than in summer months.

HIGHLIGHTS

- (1) Required on all vessels under 21 feet: This means motorboats, sailboats, kayaks, canoes, rowboats, & paddleboats, etc.
- (2) Must wear a life jacket from November 1st to May 1st.
- (3) All owners or operators must insure that everyone on board is wearing a properly fastened, USCG approved wearable PFD of an appropriate size when the vessel in "underway".

As an FYI, at all other times of year, New York law requires the use of a lifejacket when underway for everyone under the age of 12 unless in a fully enclosed cabin and for everyone regardless of age who operates a Personal Water Craft (PWC) or Jet-

US Disaster History, Oct. 29, 1850, Sagamore Steamship Explosion, San Francisco, CA

The steamboat Sagamore was built in San Francisco in early 1850 and was serving the Bay Area by June. Then disaster struck. As reported in the October 31, 1850 San Francisco Daily Alta California:

At five o'clock, just as the steamer Sagamore was casting off from Central wharf, with a large number of passengers, bound for Stockton, her boiler burst with a terrible explosion. Masses of timber and human bodies were scattered in every direction. Many bodies were blown into the water, from which they were recovered by the numerous boats which thronged about the scene of the disaster...Limbs and fragments were gathered up in baskets ...


