
NOMINATION COMMITTEE






Lock 9 - Mohawk River



Beached boats – Mohawk River between Lock 8 and 9







<u>Lake George Power Squadron</u> <u>Educational Meeting – August 24, 2011</u> <u>Course Offerings for 2011-12</u>

America's Boating Course [ABC]: This course is open to the public - The America's Boating Course is designed to familiarize the student with the fundamentals of safe boating and qualifies for certification in most states that require a boating education before operating a boat or personal watercraft. The course is structured for one night a week at two hours each session or over a weekend. A course study guide and supporting materials are available.

Subjects covered include -

- * Boat handling under normal conditions
- * Types of boats and boating terminology
- * Required and recommended equipment
- * Boating regulations and navigation rules
- * Lines and knots
- * Adverse conditions and emergencies
- * Weather
- * Charts and aids to navigation
- * Regional boating
- * Piloting techniques
- * Engine troubleshooting
- * Fundamentals of sailing
- * Marine radiotelephone usage
- * Trailer boating
- * PWC Operation

Seamanship [S]: Building on the basics taught in the ABC Boating course, Seamanship is the recommended first course for new members, both power boaters and sailors. The student learns practical marlinespike, navigation rules, hull design and performance, responsibilities of the skipper, boat care, operating a boat under normal and abnormal conditions, what to do in various emergencies and weather conditions, nautical customs and common courtesy on the water. This course provides an introduction to the USPS educational program and a strong foundation for the other Advanced Grades courses listed on the reverse side of this handout.

<u>Piloting [P]:</u> Piloting introduces the fundamentals of piloting and positioning – the study of marine charts, aids to navigation, adjustment and use of the mariner's compass, dead reckoning, planning and plotting courses, and taking bearings to determine on-the- water position.

Advanced Piloting [AP]: Advanced Piloting builds on the knowledge gained in Piloting to teach how to navigate safely in coastal waters predict tides and tidal currents and their impact on boat position, advanced positioning techniques, and the use of electronic navigation systems for positioning and course planning.

<u>Junior Navigation [JN]:</u> Junior Navigation begins the study of offshore (openocean) navigation-integrated electronic positioning systems, sight taking with a mariner's

sextant on the sun, moon, planets, and stars, how to reduce sights using the nautical almanac to determine position, and passage planning with special open ocean charts.

Navigation [N]: Navigation further develops the understanding of celestial navigation theory and the skills in sight taking and reduction-- additional sight reduction techniques and the orderly methods of carrying on the day's work of a navigator at sea. Of particular interest and importance is the study of offshore navigation using minimal data and/or equipment, such as when on a disabled vessel or lifeboat.

<u>Elective Courses</u>: Several elective courses are also available including Cruise Planning, Engine Maintenance, Instructor Development, Marine Electronics, Sail, and Weather. If you are interested in any of these elective courses – contact the Squadron Educational Officer.

Winterization Checklist

ENGINES & DRIVE TRAIN	Inspect pump impellers for wear and lightly lubricate with Teflon based grease				
Add fuel stabilizer to fuel and run engine for a few minutes to circulate stabilized fuel	Inspect water system hoses for signs of softening, cracks and bulges				
Spray fogging oil into carburetor intake while engine is running	Inspect hose clamps				
Top off fuel tank to reduce condensation	Fill plumbing with non-toxic propylene glycol-based antifreeze				
Drain water from inboard and I/O engines and risers	Prior to re-commissioning in the spring – add freshener/purifier tables to water system				
Replace water with engine antifreeze	MARINE SANITATION SYSTEMS				
Drain and replace engine oil and stabilize	Empty all waste water tanks at pump out facility				
Replace fuel and oil filters	Rise holding tank to remove residual waster and re-pump				
Remove and inspect spark plugs – spray fogging oil in cylinders	Add antifreeze to bowl – check hoses for calcification and signs of wear				
Inspect ignition wires and system components – replace as necessary	Wash out vented loops				
Inspect all hoses for signs of softening, cracks and bulges	Add antifreeze to discharge hoses and holding tanks				
Use engine flusher to remove silt, sediment from engine lower unit	INTERIOR/CABIN				
Drain and replace lower unit lube oil	Clean and drain bilge completely				
Lubricate all grease points: Trim/Tilt, steering, control cables, etc.	Inspect and lubricate all seacocks				
Clean and degrease engine if necessary	Clean out refrigerator, ice box – block open all doors				
Apply touch-up paint to drive units	Remove al cushions and curtains and store ashore				
Spray corrosion inhibitor on engine exterior	Check and clean all storage compartments				
Remove prop and inspect for damage -	Place dehumidification devices aboard				
grease prop shaft, store prop indoors	along with dryer sheets to ward of mice				
WATER SYSTEMS	Make sure vents are open to allow air flow
